Why You Shouldn't 'Heat Up' Your Car's Engine in Cold Weather

Some experts claim this is one of the biggest winter driving misconceptions out there—and it could end up costing you a lot over time.

When the inside of your car is no warmer than the frozen landscape outside, it's easy to believe you need to let your engine heat up for a minute or two by idling in your driveway before driving away.

The old adage goes that giving your engine time to reach its normal operating temperature is easier on your car than hitting the gas as soon as you turn the ignition on. One 2009 study showed that, on average, Americans believed a car's engine should be left to idle for nearly four minutes in

subfreezing temperatures—but as it turns out, this move is not only bad for your wallet and the environment, but your car as well.

In 2016, Business Insider spoke with former drag racer Stephen Ciatti to get to the bottom of this widespread myth. Ciatti has a doctorate in mechanical engineering from the University of Wisconsin-Madison and has worked on combustion engines for nearly 30 years, so he knows a thing or two about how to best treat your car. According to Ciatti, idling your machine in the cold only leads to a shorter lifespan for your engine.

In older car models that relied on carburetors to run, frigid weather did pose a threat to engine performance. Gasoline is less

researched with a wealth of marvelously organized information. Dr. Mueller's coauthor Dr. Thomas F. Haddock is considered to be the foremost expert on E-Types in the world. The book is based on observations and analysis of Dr. Mueller's collection of over 50 E-Types. The authors have literally cataloged every original part and every factory production change to that part. The authors prefer to identify E-Types by their chassis number or engine number, rather than by VIN. There are color and black-'n-white photos of every conceivable part throughout over 500 pages. One example of how detailed and thorough the book is can be found at page 183 where the authors include a photo of 34 different carburetor float chamber tags, each identified by its unique alphanumeric stamping.

The book is an invaluable resource for any JCNA Concours Judge. You can purchase a hardback edition online through Amazon or other vendors for around \$125.

There is one other book I would like to briefly discuss. At the 2022 holiday party, I was awarded a book of Jaguar history for the best British costume. "Jaguar Century: 100 Years of Automotive Excellence" by Giles Chapman (2021) is a beautifully illustrated history from the founding of Swallow Sidecars through the end of the I-Pace to be replaced with an all electric lineup. The author Chapman concludes his book with this Pollyannaish forecast: "We are promised an [electric] car with 'beautiful design, intelligent performance and revered luxury', a combination of which Sir William Lyons would surely approve if only he were still here." Really?! Next month (or later this month if I can get my article written by the newsletter deadline) we shall explore whether Chapman's EV optimism can be squared with Sir William's legacy.

Why You Shouldn't 'Heat Up' Your Car's Engine in Cold Weather Michele Debczak, Mental Floss

likely to evaporate in colder temperatures, which would have led to carburetors failing to get the right mixture of air and fuel into the engine. This sometimes caused cars to stall out, and that's likely what led to the practice of heating up vehicles in advance in the winter.

But if you're driving a car that was made in the past few decades, this is no longer something to stress over. Beginning in the 1980s, car companies began replacing carburetors with electronic fuel injection, which uses sensors to calculate the correct mixture of air and fuel to supply your engine with.

When temperatures dip below freezing, your engine is already aware of this and adjusts by introducing more gasoline into the fuel mix. By letting your car idle, you're subjecting your engine to more gasoline-rich fuel than necessary, and this ends up stripping oil from your engine's vital components.

"Gasoline is an outstanding solvent and it can actually wash oil off the walls if you run it in those cold idle conditions for an extended period of time," Ciatti told Business Insider. He said this washing action can gradually "have a detrimental effect on the lubrication and life of things like piston rings and cylinder liners." So in the end, what you intend as gentle behavior toward your car's engine could turn out to be the opposite.

Once your engine reaches a temperature of around 40 degrees it switches back to its regular fuel mixture, but idling doesn't help it hit that point any faster. According to Ciatti, the fastest way to heat up an engine is to actually drive. But don't take that as an excuse to go gunning down the driveway: Your engine will take between five and 15 minutes to reach a normal temperature from the moment you hit the gas. Until then, go easy on the pedal to avoid putting additional stress on your engine.

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Does Jaguar Have A Future?

Most of you have probably seen the new "copy nothing" 30-second ad for Jaguar. You know the one with the brightly colored costumes but no car "supposed to drive your imagination" (apologies to The Rolling Stones). If you haven't seen the ad, I recommend you don't, but if you do, make sure you watch it on an empty stomach. Jaguar is going all electric; no more fossil-fuel vehicles. You would be forgiven if you thought Jaguar had exited the car business and now designs modern art textiles. The new concept cars have a boxy shape with a futuristic look. They bear no resemblance to their predecessors. Not surprisingly, Elon Musk asked if Jaguar sells cars.

So why is Jaguar throwing a Hail Mary pass? The short answer is Jaguar has been losing money for years. Ford acquired Jaguar in 1989 for \$2.5 billion. Ford purportedly incurred cumulative losses of around \$10 billion over its 19 year ownership period. Tata Motors, an Indian company, bought Jaguar from Ford in 2008. Sales have been anemic. In the 2018-19 financial year, Jaguar sold over 180,000 vehicles, but by 2023-24, the number dropped to a little under 67.000.

As part of its cost-cutting measures and break from the past, Jaguar will stop selling the XF, XE, F-Type sports cars as well as the I-Pace, Electric E-Pace, and more popular F-Pace SUV. Jaguar doesn't much care if the new cars are polarizing because it's after high margins not volume sales.

Gerry McGovern, Jaguar/Rover's creative director, has said Jaguar has no desire to be loved by everybody. Sir William Lyons once said "copy nothing". Jaguar wants a complete break from its past. Although Jaguar claims the new concept cars are derived from the E-Type, it's hard to see any resemblance.

The new Jaguar was unveiled recently in Miami. It's a concept car denominated as "Type-00". The colors are either pink (Rhodon Rose), or if punky Barbie pink isn't your cuppa, there's London Blue. Jaguar is after "exuberant modernism." The Washington Post described the concept car as the latest example of idiotic and woke corporate virtue signaling. The concept cars are five meters long, have butterfly doors but no rear window, and have a range of 430 miles on a full charge.

Jaguar is trying to compete with Rolls Royce, Bentley and Porsche. Jaguar's concept cars don't resemble British luxury cars in any way, shape or form. I can't imagine any Porsche owner switching to Jaguar; futuristic cars without speaking to him directly. the cars are world's apart. Porsche honors its heritage; the 911 has been around for sixty years. Jaguar is discarding its past. So who do

the Jaguar concept cars compete with? The closest resemblance is to the Tesla Cybertruck, which is undoubtedly one of the ugliest vehicles ever created. Jaguar is attempting to fill the void for punk rockers who have never had a car they can call their own, except perhaps a decommissioned ambulance. But will punk rockers be able to afford the new EV Jag?

If you read my President's message, you know Giles Chapman, author of "Jaguar Century: 100 Years of Automotive Excellence," believes Sir William Lyons would surely approve of the electric concept cars' 'beautiful design, intelligent performance and revered luxury'. I have my doubts.

Okay, so what would Sir William think of the new electric Jaguar? He founded the company, made sure the cars had style, were built to a price that a reasonably well-off buyer could afford, kept a close eye on dealers (at least in the U.S.), promoted the brand world-wide, and worked to insure that they were one of the most desirable consumer goods of their time. How does Sir William's vision square with the new Jaguar electric car? Let's consider each quality separately:

- 1. Did anyone working on the electric concept car have a roll in founding Jaguar? No, but how could they? Grade: C
- 2. Do the electric concept Jaguars have style? No, except perhaps to punk rockers and Barbie doll fanatics. Grade: D
- 3. Are the electric concept cars built to a price that a reasonably well-off buyer can afford? No, the cars only appeal to the younger generation who cannot afford a price north of \$100k. Grade: F
- 4. Is Jaguar keeping a close eye on dealers? No, Jaguar dealerships are closing at an alarming rate. As part of JLR's "reimagine" strategy, JLR plans to reduce dealerships from over 80 to fewer than 20 in two years. Grade: F-
- 5. Is Jaguar promoting the brand world-wide? It's debatable whether Jaguar has a brand to promote, but assuming it does, then the new Jaguar is stirring up a lot of publicity. There's no such thing as bad publicity. Grade: C
- 6. Is Jaguar "working" to insure that they are one of the most desirable consumer goods of our time? You may trust that I'm using the word "working" advisedly. No discussion is needed. Grade: F

We may never know what Sir William would think of the all-electric
